It's been during the last fifteen years that CeCe has been able to quilt "seriously." In that time, rotary cutters and rulers have replaced the scissors and cardboard squares her grandmother started her out with.


CeCe prefers traditional block types, with a scrappy look. She is drawn to Civil War reproduction fabrics and loves the challenge of precision piecing, such as that in LoneStars and Mariner's Compass blocks. According to CeCe, "The more half-square triangles (HST) in a quilt, the better."

Hand quilting is still a favorite of CeCe's, and she always has a project involving handwork available. That said, she also enjoys free motion machine quilting on her longarm. CeCe has won multiple awards for both her hand and machine quilting. "I think I have the best of both worlds!"

Hope to everyone next month!




CPQ Helping Kids

Book Review

Quilt San Diego/Quilt Visions mounted this showing by selecting the best art quilts in 2006. Over 700 quilts were entered, and these 43 quilts are the cream of the crop.

Each quilt has a two page layout which includes a photo of the whole quilt, a close up view of a smaller section, a paragraph about the quilter, and a description of how the quilt was made.

If you are looking for inspiration or eye candy, this book is for you. Although the world of art quilts has grown by leaps and bounds since 2006, this book is a treasure-trove of past creativity.

Sewing An Accurate 1/4 Inch Seam By Carol Smith

When I was asked to write an article about sewing accurate seams, I started thinking about things like how I set up my machine. But the more I thought about it, I realized the accuracy actually starts way before I start sewing.

Fabric Prep – I'm a big believer in starching my fabric before cutting. For small pieces I use spray starch, and liquid starch for larger pieces. When my fabric is starched, my cuts are more accurate and there's a lot less fraying along the cut edges.

Cutting – The cutting process is so different depending on the project you're working on, but my best advice is to slow down and make your cuts as accurately as possible. When I started quilting I would speed through the cutting process. But I realized that sewing accurately wasn't very effective if my pieces weren't cut accurately.

Machine set up – In order to sew an accurate 1/4 inch seam it's important to sew straight on and sew straight off, which is a lot easier said than done. At first I tried using a 1/4 inch foot with a solid guide on the side – that didn't work at all for me. The guide blocked my view of the edge of the fabric, so I couldn't see if it was against the guide or drifting away from it. Then I tried using a 1/4 inch foot without the attached guide. This was better, but it felt like my feed dogs were pulling the fabric to the left. By moving my needle position to the right so that both feed dogs were under the fabric fixed that problem. But I still wasn't getting the accuracy I wanted on a consistent basis.

So here's how I set up my machine that gives me a consistent, accurate, 1/4 inch seam. I use an old plastic card like an old credit card or rewards card to make a seam guide. I put two layers of Scotch Restickable Strips (1 x 3 Inches) along one long side, on the back of the card. I let the long edges extend beyond the edge of the card, and then use a rotary cutter to trim the edges even with the card. I use Susan Cleveland's Quilter's Custom Seam Tool to place the seam guide in the correct position. I position the guide next to the presser foot extending toward me.

Test Strips – Once I have the seam guide set up, I sew at least three fabric strips together. Each strip should measure 1 1/2 by 5 inches. After sewing and pressing, the middle strip should measure exactly 1 inch. I like to use my ruler that has the full length lines at every 1/8 inch for this. You want to be really picky at this step.

Pinning – Using this type of seam guide set up means you have to pin with the head of the pins on the left, which may be the opposite of what you're used to. It took me awhile to get used to pinning this way, but now I do it automatically.

I know what you're thinking - boy that sounds like a lot of work just to sew a seam!! But I love blocks with lots of parts, and it makes me really happy when all those parts come together smoothly and my block finishes square and measuring the correct size. If you'd like additional information, try Sally Collins' book or video called Precision Piecing.


